Who were the first people to live in Derby?	Roman coin and other discoveries Map of Roman Britain Marcus Street Roman well Domesday Book entry	<p>Derby's Early Settlers Information PowerPoint Children will learn about the Roman settlement at Little Chester and how this led to the beginning of Derby. They will discover what happened between the Saxons and Vikings and how this led to Derby gaining its name. The Domesday entry will provide children will vital information so they can see how early Derby looked.</p> <p>Derby's Early Settlers Timeline Map This activity can be completed while working through the PowerPoint. It will allow children to make notes of key dates and events from the Romans, Saxons, and Vikings time periods.</p> <p>Little Chester Roman Discoveries Children will analyse a record of materials found whilst excavating in the Little Chester area. They will use the guided question sheet to help them understand what was found and the importance of knowing about each item.</p> <p>Mapping Little Chester Roman Settlement Children will compare a modern-day map with an illustrated map of what the Little Chester settlement looked like. How did Derby continue to develop?	Royal trading charter of 1157 1610 Map of Derby Location photographs	<p>How Derby Continued to Develop Information PowerPoint Children will learn about how Derby continued to develop during the Medieval period. They will learn about Derby receiving its first trading charter from the king, the development of the Market Place and the impact of the Black Death on the town.</p> <p>Medieval Derby Map and Streets Activity Children will compare a map produced by John Speed in 1610, with a map of Derby today. They will analyse the two maps to see which streets remain and how the city has changed from being a town in that time period.</p> <p>History Defenders – Derby Buildings of Faith Research Activity Children will learn about the demolition of an important church within the city. They will then produce fact files for the remaining places of worship within the city and explain why they need defending from future redevelopment plans.</p> <p>Extended Task: What can you find out about other historical buildings within Derby?</p>	St James Priory, Benedictine Monks, Charter, moot hall, Market Place, Black Death.

Historical photographs Historical map Wright's Directory of South Derbyshire entry	<p>Industrial Derby PowerPoint This presentation will teach children about the industries that have helped Derby focusing on some of the ones that Derby is most famous for.</p> <p>Royal Crown Derby Research Task Using this scaffolded research sheet, children will use the internet to find out more about one of Derby's most famous exports, Royal Crown Derby pottery.</p> <p>Trade Directory Analysis Task Children will study an entry from an 1874 trade directory to get an idea of some of the jobs that people were doing in Derby towards the end of the Industrial Revolution.</p>	Industrial Revolution, smiths, leatherworkers, Corn Exchange, Royal Crown Derby, porcelain,

		<p>The task will require them to find out the meaning behind some of the job titles that are not familiar to us today. <p>What role did Derby play in the World Wars?</p>	<p>Historical photographs Historical maps Newspaper account German pilot's account Derbyshire's Victoria Cross Heroes Information Text</p>	<p>Derby at War PowerPoint This PowerPoint will teach children about the two world wars and their impact on Derby. They will learn about what war time was like for people in Derby and events that happened during World War 1 and World War 2.</p> <p>Research a World War 1 War Hero Children will be provided with the names of Derbyshire's five Victoria Cross recipients and a sheet that will scaffold their research about one of them. Information is readily available online about each man. Alternatively, a Derbyshire's Victoria Cross Heroes Information Text is provided which contains all of the information that they require. This activity could be the basis for a biography writing task.</p> <p>Rolls-Royce Air Raid Activity This activity will provide children with two different accounts of the air raid on the Rolls-Royce factory during World War 2. By answering the series of questions provided, children will be encouraged to analyse the two accounts while thinking about reasons why some information may not be accurate or why key information may have been deliberately withheld.</p> <p>Extended Task: Can you find any personal accounts about living in Derby during either of the wars?</p>	<p>World War 1, Sherwood Foresters, Derbyshire Yeomanry, Midland Railway Locomotive Works, Derby Carriage and Wagon Works, howitzers, zeppelin, Victoria Cross, World War 2, Derby Guildhall, Rolls-Royce Factory.</p>
<p>Which people have had a significant impact on Derby in the 20th and 21st centuries?</p>	<p>Historical photographs Biographies</p>	<p>Significant Derby People PowerPoint This PowerPoint will provide information about some of the people who have had a significant impact on Derby in the 20th and 21st Centuries. Nine different people are featured with short biographies and an outline of what they have done for Derby.</p> <p>Pyramid of Significance This activity will prompt debate on which people from Derby have had the biggest impact. It will encourage children to not only think about what these people did but how it influenced Derby and if it still does today.</p> <p>Made in Derby Research Activity Children will research an influential person or group that has links to Derby. They will design a 'Made in Derby' plaque for that person, detailing what impact they have had on the city through time.</p> <p>Extended Task: Is there another influential person from Derby that you could learn about?</p>	<p>Philip Noel-Baker, Alice Wheeldon, Louis Martin, Charles Rolls, Henry Royce, Liam Sharp, Lara Croft.</p>
